Prisoners may be deprived of these articles must be made  
by the Storekeeper opposite the names of the Individuals  
and reported from time to time.

As soon as every necessary provision has been made for  
the comfort of the Men and the Security of the Stores, you will  
proceed to explore the neighbouring Country, so as to ascertain  
whether there are any Rivers or other Objects of importance, to  
examine the nature and quality of the Soil, its fertility and  
the purposes to which it may appear more immediately  
applicable with reference to the views of Settlers.

When the course of two Months a Village will be disengaged  
from hence with additional Supplies, and by that oppor-  
tunity you will return provided you have established the  
Settlement, and on all the necessary observations on the Country  
in the neighbourhood, you will then leave of the charge of the  
Settlement with Captain Wakefield.

Lieutenant Governor Arthur of Van Diemen's  
Land, has been apprized of the steps now taken, and it is  
the wish of his Excellency that you inform the former  
Governor by the first Opportunity which may offer of the  
Settlement having been established. Should you from any  
impediment be in need of Supplies which can be more con-  
veniently be procured from Port Dalrymple than from  
this place, you will also in that case address yourself to the  
Commandant at that Station, who will be instructed to  
communicate with you.

It is very desirable that no time should be lost in  
ascertaining as far as practicable the natural Productions  
of the Country, in order that their utility for supplying the  
immediate wants of the Settlement, or for the purposes of  
Commerce may be known. With this view a Gardener is to  
embark on board of the Anarchy for the purpose of collecting
